Historically speaking

The Puslinch Historical Society was formed in 1984 to bring together those people interested in the heritage of Puslinch Township. The Society is non-profit and operated by volunteers.

If you enjoy history, we invite you to join our organization. We are especially looking for new members for our executive who can assist in various activities such as:

- · writing an article,
- planning a historic or spirit walk,
- arranging a visit to a local site,
- organizing an information night, or
- greeting visitors searching for their roots at our archives located in the Puslinch Library in Aberfoyle.

Note that due to COVID 19 public events are on hold but investigation and planning are in progress.

At the library we provide assistance researching a variety of topics. We have information on local families, villages and settlements, local veterans, lot histories, cemeteries, township papers and so much more.

You are invited to find out more about the resources available for you.

For example, 5 Victoria Street is one of three original log homes in Morriston.



Built by the Schlegels in 1853-54, the same year that the family came to Morriston from Germany. It is a fine example of a pioneer's first real home. In the 1850s there were up to three families living in this small cabin.

Rev. Beese was a minister and had served at Morriston Evangelical Church 1894-1908 and had returned to retire here in the 50's. Rev. and Mrs. Beese and their son Carl and his wife Margaret (Hingleman) lived together at 5 Victoria Street.

Carl had some physical disabilities and built this car to scoot around the village. He was a well-known photographer.



This is a photo of Carl and Marg Beese in his custom car on Victoria Street looking west towards Highway 6.

In the photo you can see the old town hall which has since been demolished and the site turned into a park. The next house to the north has since had the siding removed and returned to log. The house two up from that was destroyed by fire in the 60's.

Currently visits to the archives are by appointment only. Check out our website *www.puslinchhistorical.ca* to arrange a visit. The site also provides many links to other informative sites.

The Society has a great number of publications available at the archives or by mail. These books are a wealth of information but since most are now out of print there are limited quantities available.

Whether you have been in Puslinch for a lifetime or are new to the area, we would love to have you on our team. Membership in the society is \$15 for individuals and \$20 for families

Council Clips

2022 Proposed Budget:

Township launches a Community Engagement Survey to gain citizen feedback for the 2022 proposed budget. The survey will be active on *engagepuslinch.ca* from Oct 26 to Jan 26/22.

PCC Park Renovation & Upgrade:

Requesting proposal submissions for design, tender preparation and construction administration of numerous enhancements at the PCC Park in Aberfoyle.

Council requests Recreation Committee to champion the community fundraising efforts for these improvements along with Old Morriston park improvements.

Speeding on Hume Road:

Delegation appears before Council requesting to reduce the speed limit from 60 km/hr to 50 on Hume Road with reasonable traffic calming measures.

Morriston Medical Centre:

MTO requested to reconsider traffic lights at Telfer Glen Street & Hwy 6.

County Roads Master Action Plan: Staff requested to include funds to hire consultant to review County Road proposal through Aberfoyle as part of 2022 budget.

External Audit Services:

A by-law to appoint RLB as its auditor until December 31, 2023 with the option to renew for a period of two years.

Neubauer & Mast Pits:

St. Mary's Cement seeks to increase the tonnage condition to 1,250,000 tonnes.

Council does not support this proposal unless St. Mary's complies with current operational plan, including the requirement that material will be moved under the municipal road via conveyor.

City of Guelph Water Supply Master Plan Update:

Council requests a longer review window to review the update given the technical nature of the topic and the potential impact to the Township.

By-law to Prohibit and Regulate Publicized Displays:

Council proposes a by-law to prohibit and regulate publicized displays that occur on private property and the nuisance impacts arising therefrom.

Hwy 6 Mid-Block Project Interchange Project – Concession 7 Agreement:

Staff directed to commence discussions with the County to initiate the process and formalize conveying ownership of Concession 7 between Wellington Road 34 and Maltby Road to Wellington County once MTO completes its construction work on Concession 7.

Beverage Alcohol Sales:

Council considers request from Ultramar Gas located at 311 Brock Rd S for the sale of beverage alcohol on eligible holidays.

Caulfield-Carter Farm 880 Victoria Rd S:

Heritage Committee has provided an update regarding this property in the Township owned by the City of Guelph as being vacant for a number of years and in need of stabilization to help prevent further deterioration.

First Nations Acknowledgement Statement – Heritage Register: The Township worked with a consultant to draft the First Nations Acknowledgement Statement to accompany the Heritage Register.

Future of Fire Service:

Council to defer further consideration of a second fire station until there is improved, consistent and dependable business day coverage at the main station and there is a demonstrated need for a second station, and Council approve a three year extension of the current fire protection agreement with the City of Cambridge.



Optimist Club of Puslinch – Awards Scholarships for 2021

The Optimist Club of Puslinch has once again awarded scholarships to assist youth and families of the Township of Puslinch with educational expenses and to promote the Club as an organization committed to the advancement of education.

This was the 20th year that the Club has offered the scholarship program. Since its inception in 2001 the club has awarded over \$60,000 in scholarships. Three scholarships of \$1000 each were available for the 2021-2022 school year.

for either the academic or community college scholarships.

End of state of emergency

In consultation with the Medical Officer of Health for Wellington-Dufferin-Guelph Public Health, the County of Wellington aims to end its State of Emergency on December 31, 2021 at 11:59 pm if COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations continue to decline and if the paediatric COVID-19 vaccination (ages 5-11 years old) process is under way.

The County declared a State of Emergency on March 23, 2020, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"I have spoken with City of Guelph Mayor Cam Guthrie and Dufferin County Warden Darren White, and we are all on the same page," said Warden Kelly Linton. "While there is no longer a need for a local State of Emergency to be in place, the pandemic is not over. I continue to urge all residents to get vaccinated and continue to follow guidance from Wellington-Dufferin-Guelph Public Health."

"After nearly 20 months of a global pandemic, it is time to chart a path back to something more normal for all of us. I applaud our municipal partners for all they have done to protect residents from COVID-19 and look forward to charting a careful end to restrictions that reflects the reality and needs of our communities," said Dr. Nicola Mercer Medical Officer of Health and CEO for Wellington-Dufferin-Guelph Public Health.

"Ending the pandemic is a job for all of us. Please continue to follow public health guidance so that as we approach the time to ease restrictions, we are as safe and as ready as we can be."

To date, nearly 80 percent of eligible Wellington County residents are fully vaccinated with a COVID- 19 vaccine.












In Memoriams

Or perhaps you want to support women refugees in Jordan with the purchase of their pure olive oil soap or other care products through *Sittisoap.com*. This enterprise was started by two women in Toronto.

Closer to home, you could also purchase your tea and coffee equipment from *Grosche.ca* in Guelph, where every product they sell funds their safe water project, with 50 days of water provided to someone in need.

And talking of coffee, you can also support your local shelter by buying coffee through Planet Bean who donates 15 percent to shelters for women. **Sistersstorycoffee.com**

Another option is to host a Kits for a Cause party, where you and your guests (at home or at work) pull together kits to give to those in need. Could be homeless, women in shelters, you can decide.

You just set your budget, contact folks at *kitsforacause.com* and they do the rest, getting the supplies to you.





Book Review

ADAM'S ALE A HISTORY OF WATER IN PUSLINCH

Marjorie Clark's new short book, *Adam's Ale: a history of water in Puslinch*, quietly and powerfully tells of the Township of Puslinch's use of its water for the past 130 years.

Her fact-filled account moves from the historical waterways and their geography to how they have been adapted by the inhabitants through the years -

with little hints included here and there which suggest that all may not be well with the water supply in Puslinch.

Human activity has forever changed water reservoirs sometimes a little, sometimes a great deal.

Approximately three-quarters of the way through this book, Marjorie presents disturbing facts about local water and its close inter-dependent relationships with gravel pits (natural filtration), chemical dumping (resultant run off) and water harvesting (extraction).

Some of this information is quite disconcerting for the water health of the region.

In the present world of climate enlightenment, one has to ask if Puslinch water is a misused commodity and if it may be becoming an endangered one.

The concerns presented mean that the Township, its citizens, industry and all other levels of related government need to take serious measures to keep local water clean, to have it continuously available to the community and to keep it protected for the future.

Nearly five years in the making, Back Home Again is an animated movie that captures what happened in Fort McMurray back in May, 2016 when the forest fires swept through the community, forcing the largest wildfire evacuation in Alberta's history, with upwards of 88,000 people forced from their homes.

Charmaine Hammond, who was a former resident of Fort McMurray was invited back to help in the aftermath and to instigate conversations about recovery and resiliency.

The Dish with One Spoon

I used to work as a curatorial assistant at the Royal Ontario Museum, where I cared for collections of First Nations artifacts. Among these objects was a wampum belt, an item of immense importance.

This "Dish With One Spoon" wampum belt recorded and signified the "Great Peace Treaty" of 1701 between the Haudenosaunee (the Iroquois Confederacy of Seneca, Mohawk, Onondaga, Oneida and Cayuga) and the Anishinaabe First Nations (including the Mississauga).

These Nations had been at war over control of the hunting grounds in the territory above the Great Lakes, (referred to as "The Beaver Wars") in order to supply furs to French and English traders.

The lands encompassed Southern Ontario, including what is now Puslinch Township. For hundreds of years prior, Puslinch had been settled by the Attawandaron (also known as the Neutral), a farming First Nation that was wiped out in 1650 due to smallpox, famine and fur trade wars with the Seneca.

The Dish With One Spoon treaty was an agreement to peacefully share and steward these land resources.


The Dish represents the land and natural resources of what is now Southern Ontario.

The "Spoon" symbolizes the portion each Nation would take in order to conserve the land for future generations, and in so doing, make sure the Dish would never empty.

Since there is one spoon and no knife, the belt also represents peace among these Nations.

After the "Great Peace Treaty" the Mississauga lived and stewarded these lands in southern Ontario until December 2021/January 2022

the "Between the Lakes Purchase" (Treaty 3) was signed with the British Crown in 1792.



The Haudenosaunee used this concept to form their Confederacy in the 1400s, before European contact.

"We promise to have only one dish among us; in it will be beaver tail and no knife will be there'... We will have one dish, which means that we will all have equal shares of the game roaming about in the hunting grounds and fields, and then everything will become peaceful among all of the people" (Lytwyn: 211.)

The Doctrine of Discovery

The "Doctrine of Discovery" was the prevailing law that gave British and European Monarchs the right to claim title to lands that were not under Christian rule.

Such lands could then be granted it to businesses, churches and individuals. First Nations did not share this concept of private property ownership.

They identified land as a living entity that could not be privately owned. When the "Between the Lakes Purchase" treaty was signed the Mississauga believed that they would continue to have rights to hunt and fish on these lands.

But Europeans did not share this concept, and the British Crown, assuming ownership, surveyed and sold off the lands.

The Mississauga gradually retreated to settlements along the Credit River at present day Port Credit where they had maintained fishing rights.

In 1847, under similar development pressures, the Mississauga of the Credit moved to the Six Nations Reserve near Hagersville, accepting the land offered there by the Haudenosaunee in keeping with the Treaty of the Dish With One Spoon.

The Report of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission has called upon all levels of government to reject ideas that justified European sovereignty over Indigenous lands and peoples, such as the Doctrine of Discovery.

The Commission has also charged each level of government to acknowledge traditional Indigenous lands within their jurisdictions.

The Dish With One Spoon Covenant speaks to our collective responsibility to steward and sustain the land and environment in which we live and work, so that all peoples, present and future, may benefit from the sustenance it provides.

Cook's Corner

Seafood dish with vegetables and feta cheese

This dish is easy and makes a tasty meal. I served it over pasta but it would also be nice with rice or a crusty baguette. Instead of 1 lb. of shrimp, I used ½ lb. of shrimp and ½ lb. of scallops.



2 tsp. olive oil
1 cup chopped red onions
1 medium zucchini, chopped
2 tsp. minced garlic
½ tsp. dried oregano
½ cup dry white wine
796 ml. can of diced tomatoes
1 tbsp. balsamic vinegar
¼ tsp. each salt and black pepper
¼ cup chopped fresh basil leaves
1 lb. large uncooked shrimp, peeled, deveined and tails removed
½ cup crumbled feta cheese
1 tbsp. fresh parsley

- Heat olive oil over medium-high heat in a 10" skillet. Add onions, zucchini and garlic. Cook and stir until vegetables are softened, about 5 minutes. Add oregano and cook 30 more seconds. Add wine, tomatoes, vinegar, salt and pepper.
- 2. Mix well. Reduce heat to medium and simmer, uncovered, for about 8 minutes, until most of the wine has evaporated.
- Stir in basil and shrimp. Cook and stir until shrimp turns pink and no gray remains, about 4 minutes. Don't overcook shrimp or they will be rubbery.
- 4. Remove from heat and sprinkle with feta cheese and parsley. Serve hot.

Lime cream cheese tart



The combination of limes and creamy cheese filling makes this tart luscious and, as a bonus, it's easy to make.

Crust

1½ cups chocolate or vanilla wafer crumbs (I used chocolate crumbs; don't use graham crumbs)

2 tbsp. white sugar

1 tbsp. water

2 tbsp. vegetable oil

Fillina

3/4 cup white sugar
1 tbsp. all-purpose flour
1/3 cup fresh lime juice
1 tbsp. finely grated lime rind
3/4 cup low-fat or regular sour cream
2 oz. cream cheese, softened
2 eggs
Green food colouring (optional)

Topping

1 cup low-fat or regular sour cream 3 tbsp. white sugar

- In a bowl, stir together the wafer crumbs, sugar, water and oil until combined.
- 2. Pat the mixture over the bottom and up the side of a 9" greased pie plate.
- In a food processor or blender, puree sugar, flour, lime juice and rind, sour cream, cream cheese, eggs and green food colouring until smooth. Pour it into the crust.
- Place the pie plate in the centre of the oven and bake at 375° for 25 to 30 minutes or until the centre is just set.
- For the topping, stir together the sour cream and sugar. Pour the mixture carefully over the hot filling, smoothing it evenly with a knife.
- Return the pie to the oven and bake for 10 minutes.
- 7. Let the pie cool on a wire rack. Chill before serving.

Don't fall for the latest online shopping scams

- Do your research and comparison shop so you have a sense of realistic pricing
- Read the terms and conditions, as well as refund and return policies
- Use your Internet browser's ad blocker to hide sponsored ads and pop-ups
- Request a full refund if your order is unavailable or can't be fulfilled at the advertised price
- Keep any records of email confirmations and customer service conversations
- Review your credit card and bank statements carefully for recurring or unknown charges
- Remember that if the price is too good to be true, it probably is
- Take online reviews with a grain of salt, and consult multiple sources for feedback

Ask the expert

What can I do in the winter to enjoy my gardening hobby?

In winter the gardens are quiet. Spring, summer and fall activities are over. Maybe you are relieved that there is nothing to do in the garden or maybe you miss it all.

You might be a seasonal gardener who springs into action when the snow melts but you might be someone who wants to continue thinking about and planning the outdoor landscape.

Maybe you want to grow your own seedlings and plants during the winter months.

With a windowsill, preferably facing south, you can grow a small selection of annuals. With an array of artificial lights, you can grow a selection that hopefully matches your desires.

These lights can be fancy three tired arrangements with led lights or you might find a used arrangement online.



This picture shows a Rubber Maid Container almost 4' long, around \$45 from Canadian Tire and a 4' Led light for \$125 from Lee Valley Tools.

I cut a hole in the side of the container to accommodate the Led light. I could use the set-up right way. It is easy to transport and keeps all soil and water in the container. It is also warm and protected on all sides. I have used this for five years and it has produced a lot of plants.

If you are keen to grow your own plants, it is important to order seeds as early as possible. There was a

backlog of seed orders in almost all seed houses last winter.

Seed houses will have interesting seeds for you to try. Here are some examples:

Hawthorn Farm is a local organic seed house selling open pollinated seeds; you can save seeds harvested from open pollinated plants and they will come true to the original plants.

Botany.ca is a Waterloo seed house with many varieties and a website that will teach you not only botany, but also everything about germination.

The famous herb house, **Richters**, has seeds at very good prices. They also have a greenhouse in Goodwood that is a treat to visit in the darkest months.

OSC in Waterloo has a good selection of vegetable and flower seeds at very good prices.

Wildflower Farm in Schonberg sells wildflower seeds. These seeds often need to be stratified. This is not hard to do and the results are very satisfying. You just need to do a bit of planning. Wildflower Farm has good information on how to stratify your wildflower seeds.

Many seed houses in the USA will ship to Canada. For example, **Baker Creek Seeds** has a beautiful catalogue with organic varieties.

Jelitto has many specialty perennials that you can get nowhere else. And in March we can look forward to local Seedy Saturdays where the public can exchange seeds and get much good advice.

Besides starting your own plants, planning a new bed can be exciting. Continuing Education often offers plant design courses.

English landscape designer John Brookes has written several books on design that can help you.

Guelph Wellington Master Gardeners offers a one-day Horticultural event in February, called *A Day in the Garden*, with speakers and demonstrations. We hope to offer this again in 2022.

The Guelph Arboretum is a treasure of learning, and lastly, the many Horticultural groups in our region make sure that you can stay active in the Horticultural world all winter.

County wins award

County staff were challenged to reimagine their community outreach and public education and awareness efforts. Many events and activities that would have typically occurred in person, were held virtually.



Remarkable **Puslinch People**

Malcolm **McCormick** Scholar and Educator

Malcolm McCormick died on Friday, June 10, 1932, at the home of his sister, Mary McNaughton in Guelph, at the age of 77 years.

Prominent in educational circles in Guelph, he was widely known as a man of exceptional attainments.

Malcolm McCormick was a native of Puslinch Township, born on August 29, 1854, the eighth child of ten, to William McCormick and Betty McMillan.

His parents emigrated from Argyllshire, Scotland in 1841 and were among the original settlers of the district. He spent his boyhood in Puslinch, where his desire for knowledge manifested itself early.

He was one of the most eager readers of the Crieff School Library, borrowing 18 books in a six month period at the age of 13.



Malcolm attended Crieff Public School and received his secondary education at the Galt Collegiate, under the guidance of Dr. Tassie, one of the most noted teachers of that time. Later, he graduated with his B. A. from Queen's University, Kingston.

He took up the teaching profession and held positions in Belleville, Kingston and Poughkeepsie, NY, among others.

In 1884, he opened the Guelph Business College and conducted that institution for thirty years.

The 2nd Annual Circular and Catalogue of the school, now held in the archives of the Guelph Civic Museum, gives the Guelph Business College motto as "Les Affaires Font Les Hommes" or "Business Makes the Man".

He was the founder of the Canadian Club, which was formed in Guelph in 1888. The purpose of the club was stated as: to study the history, literature, art, music and natural resources of Canada; the recognition of Canadian worth and talent; and the fostering of patriotic Canadian sentiment.

Malcolm McCormick was also a poet

and his ode to Puslinch Lake provoked a poem in response from Donald Mc-Caig, another Puslinch native, educator and poet.

On August 9, 1893, Malcolm married Helen Anderson.

Of a sensitive nature and perhaps overworked, in 1914, he suffered a nervous breakdown. He sold his interests in the Guelph Business College with the intention to retire.

He lived in Puslinch Township for several years, after which, in 1921, he operated another business college at 17 River Road in Welland, Ontario. Then, in an effort to improve his health, he moved to the west.

While in Edmonton, where he resided for about five years, he conducted private lessons in languages, of which he spoke seven.

One of these was undoubtedly the Highland Scottish Gaelic of his forefathers, which he would have learned from his parents, who likely spoke it in their home, and the others probably the classical Latin and Greek, French, Italian and Spanish. After this, he lived for a short time in Vancouver.

In his later years, he took up residence with his sister, Barbara Campbell, at Dorchester Station, near London, Ontario. Then, for a few months before his death, with another sister, Mary McNaughton in Guelph.

His funeral was held at Mary Mc-Naughton's home, 168 Waterloo Ave. in Guelph on Sunday, June 12th, with burial in Killean Cemetery. There was a large attendance of the citizenry of Puslinch, as well as friends and relatives from Guelph, Galt, Orangeville, Toronto, Hillsburgh and Clyde. It was the passing of an accomplished man.
