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Council Clips

Mini Lakes:

Council authorizes Noise Exemption to permit use of a scare gun to scare away geese during prescribed periods and times on a go-forward basis subject to no complaints being received.

Grant Allocations:

Council approves grants amounting to \$16,870 to Aberfoyle Agricultural Society, Aberfoyle Farmer's Market, Crieff Hills Retreat, Ellis Chapel, Whistlestop Preschool, Sunrise Centre, Friends of Mill Creek and Optimist Club of Puslinch.

Property Tax Levy & Due Dates:

Interim property taxes billed at 50 percent of previous year's levy and due in two instalments February 29 and April 30, 2024.

Management of Aggregate Resources:

Council receives December 2023 audit report from the Auditor General following review of the Ministry of Natural Resources management of the Aggregates Act.

Fire Chief:

Council authorize staff to commence recruitment for the full time permanent position of Fire Chief and renewal of existing Shared Service Agreement with Twp of Centre Wellington until complete.

Parks Revitalization:

Township receives \$3,000 donation from Puslinch Minor Ball for parks revitalization.

Triton Water Canada:

Proposed by-law to authorize a Private Well Interference Complaints Resolution Agreement with Triton Water (formerly Nestlé Waters).

High Speed Internet:

Governments of Ontario and Canada have announced funding for Rogers to complete high speed internet projects here in Puslinch. To serve 1,100 homes, concentrated mostly west of Brock Road, plus east of Highway 6 and south of Highway 401. Completion end of 2024.

Kerr Crescent Storm Water Management Facility:

Staff directed to approach County of Wellington requesting that a cost sharing agreement for maintenance of stormwater facility be established.

Puslinch by Design Employment Land Study:

Council receives Draft Scope of Work prepared by Wellington County Planning. Study recognizes strategic importance of lands near the Highways 401 and Highway 6 corridors for future industrial designation.

Hanlon Midblock Interchange:

Spring – Fall 2024 roundabout at WR 34 and Conc 7 to be constructed. Conc 7 will be closed, and traffic detoured onto Hwy 6/Hanlon between WR 34 and Maltby Rd.

When Midblock interchange and Conc 7 can be open, Hwy 6/Hanlon and WR 34 intersection will be closed for construction of new bridge over the Hanlon for WR 34.

To access WR 34 and/or Conc 7 traffic will travel through Hwy 6/ Hanlon Midblock interchange.

Open Gym on PA Days:

Recreation Advisory Committee provides comments for Council's consideration to have open gym times on school PA days.

Budget 2024:

Proposed 4.9 percent tax increase in 2024 on the Township portion of the tax bill.

Carter-Caulfield Farmhouse 880 Victoria Rd:

City of Guelph considering moving this municipally owned historic home to another area of the site, then sever the lot and sell it.

Lake Road:

Black Cat radar device installed found 85 percent of vehicles scanned were driving 70 to 79 km/hr and does not warrant enhanced enforcement despite protests from residents to return alleged speeding hot spot back to its original speed limit.

She visited many different countries and shared those travel journeys through her humorous story telling.



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2023 Luella Logan Award & Scholarship, go to Puslinch Residents

Wellington County Council named Barb McKay the 2023 recipient of the Luella Logan Award for Outstanding Service by a Woman in Politics.

The Award comes with \$1500 which the recipient donates to a charity of her choice. Barb chose Wellington Women in Crisis.

With an undergrad BA from the University of Guelph Barb went on to get her Master of Social Work (MSW) from the University of Toronto.

She earned certificates in Gerentology, Sexuality, Death and Dying, Negotiation and Mediation, and Family Therapy.

As a social worker Barb worked at St. Joseph's Health Care Centre in

Guelph, and the Woodview Children's Centre in Hamilton.

And with her husband Don she still helps run a beef and sheep farm just south of Morriston.

In 1987 Barb joined Guelph-Wellington Women in Crisis (GWWC) and was part of the expansion into Puslinch of the agency's Rural Women's Support Program, now the Rural Women's Shelter Program.

She was also a member of the local Women's Institute, finding speakers for meetings.

Barb's contribution to the political life of Puslinch is impressive.

Before running for Council, Barb was appointed Puslinch representative on Hamilton Conservation Authority. When seeking a seat on Puslinch Council, she was the first candidate ever to knock on every door in the Township.

Barb was elected in 1997 serving for nine years. In 2006 she was elected to County council and served four years.

During her time on Puslinch Council she became part of the original Community Oriented Policing (COP) Committee, on the Puslinch Planning Advisory Committee, Wellington Community Futures and Wellington Farm Safety.

At the county level she served on the Social Services and Land Division Committees, St. Joseph's Health Care Board, and MacDonald Stewart (art Gallery) board. Barb volunteered with the local Special Olympics committee for five years, participated in two Habitat for Humanity projects, ten years with Friends of Mill Creek, joined 100 Women Who Care, and joined medical, dental or optical projects in Central and South America with Medical Ministry International.

Barb is an avid reader, keen bridge player, enjoys golf and hiking, and special-interest movies. She has made volunteering part of her lifestyle that she says enriches the lives of those receiving assistance, and of those who participate.

Barb's advice to young people is, "Get involved in your community organizations. You are never too young. It's part of being good citizens".

It is clear that Barb McKay is a humanitarian: one who seeks to promote human welfare. She is also one who is very deserving of the prestigious Louella Logan Award recognition.

The Scholarship grants \$1500 to a young woman pursuing postsecondary studies in political science, public administration at a Canadian college or university.

County Council awarded the Luella Logan Scholarship to Claire Atkins of Puslinch.

Claire is currently studying for a BA degree in political science with a minor in economics at McGill University. Sincere congratulations to both recipients.

Mayor's Message

Hello everyone, I hope you had a great holiday season with family and friends. I want to take this opportunity to provide an update on items within the Township.

Puslinch Community Centre

The upgrades to the PCC property are nearing completion. It is our expectation that all the new facilities will be open during 2024. We have reconstructed the tennis courts. Two courts will receive markings for pickle ball while the third will remain solely marked for tennis at this time.

New walking paths have been constructed. These paths are built in accordance with the accessibility requirements. Some paths did not receive asphalt topping as the path was within the GRCA regulated flood plain and that was not permissible.

You will be able to walk "loops" within the property, which is an excellent new feature to the PCC grounds. The rear large lit soccer field received a fresh layer of sod at the end of 2023. We are very excited to see our youth utilizing this new full size lit field in 2024.

Aggregate

Puslinch is the host to many aggregate operations. Council and I have been keeping a very close eye on the operations within our Township. These operations under the planning act are intended to be interim land uses.

The reality is, they rarely surrender the license. Aggregate operation licenses and operational enforcement is entirely under the Provincial Governments area of jurisdiction. For us, these operations tend to turn into a tax and operational shelters.

The operations do not pay their fair taxes (leading to residential taxes making up that shortcoming) as well as being able to achieve land use permissions within the licensed area, which the Township may not otherwise endorse.

In short, we may start to see more industrial uses inside these aggregate operations as the Provincial Government loosens requirements or removes them entirely.

Through TAPMO I continue to advocate for the province to enforce compliance of aggregate operators to their site plans. TAPMO executive members were invited to participate with the Auditor General's Staff as part of their Value for Money Audit.

This audit looked at how well the Government is managing aggregate in Ontario. That report can be found here: (https://www.auditor.on.ca/en/content/annualreports/arreports/en23/AR_mgmtaggregates_en23.pdf). The report is very alarming to Puslinch Council and TAPMO.

What we are seeing in Puslinch is a liberal approach to permissions granted in site notes. I believe when applications are brought forward, the intent is the aggregate from that site shall be processed on site. When exhausted, that interim land use (aggregate) in theory would cease and the license surrendered.

What we are seeing is the aggregate operations spreading similar to disease, using the first site as the processing location and importing material from other locations. When approving pits in Puslinch, is the intent that Puslinch process all material in perpetuity?

If so, the Public needs to know/understand this. I don't believe our community should have the impacts of aggregate from other Municipalities, I also don't believe portable/temporary processing equipment should be utilized to process raw material from off site for decades.

Portable/temporary processing plants are not required to meet the same standards as permanent plants, this is a loop hole that needs to be addressed.

These are just a few of many concerns I have around the aggregate operations in Puslinch. We will continue to advocate for strict compliance to site plans, in hopes to restore some public confidence in the approval and enforcement of this industry.

Wellington Road 35 Bridge replacement

Unfortunately, even with every effort to have this bridge open for January of 2024, we were not able to make this happen.

The emergency bridge replacement has had significant impacts on our local roads; one especially is Sideroad 10. The increased traffic on our gravel roads required significantly more maintenance. Staff made every effort to detour traffic to the newly paved Concession 7. Unfortunately, this preferred detour was the "long" way around. People just opted to take our gravel roads.

Wellington County provided financial contributions to Puslinch to cover the additional cost of maintenance of our roads due to the detour, we are very appreciative of that contribution.

The timing of the construction of the new build is not reflective of a poor contractor, mismanagement by Wellington County Council or staff. As I stated earlier this is an emergency bridge replacement. Permits are required from third party organizations, which likely had other projects to review

We did see some delays on permits being issued. With that, every attempt was made to have the bridge open by January of 2024. Staff will continue to monitor roads used as detours and continue an increased maintenance schedule.

Paving roads Program

Puslinch Council continues to support improving gravel roads. Puslinch paved Concession 7 last year, marking the first time in 20 years a new segment of rural road was upgraded. I have been informed that each 3.8km of gravel road that is paved cost more than a million dollars to upgrade to paved surface.

Puslinch Council continues to increase the contribution to the gravel roads improvement reserve. This budget cycle will see an additional \$50,000 placed in the reserve. We will likely be paving another section of road in 2025 or 2026 budget cycles.

Speeding

Myself and all of council understand speeding is a concern in Puslinch. The most important thing we can do is report our concerns to the OPP.

This accomplishes two things. The OPP is data driven for its deployment of resources. The OPP need to be aware of community concerns to help address them. This goes for all petty crimes too (looting items from your unlocked car), please report them.

Secondly by reporting speeding concerns it gives the OPP the opportunity to deploy devices that measure speeding, called Black Cats.

Your Wellington County Council is also taking a very close look at the OPP contract. Wellington County pays for additional officers beyond the "basic" OPP contract. County Council wants to ensure these additional expenditures are addressing the concerns we have in the community.

Wellington County is leading the way on electronic speed enforcement. The County created Community safety zones, which permit Electronic Speed Enforcement.

Aberfoyle is one of those zones. Once the program (electronic speed enforcement) is up and running Puslinch Council will be



looking at creating more safety zones, and how to implement electronic speed enforcement. It is a possibility for Puslinch to create their own Electronic Speed enforcement program, however it would be very costly and expensive and likely will duplicate work being done at the County level.

I understand it may seem a slow process, however I believe it is in our interest to work with the County program vs build our own.

High Speed internet

I will be the first to admit I am not the expert on this topic. Councilor Sepulis has been working from the beginning with the Highspeed internet committee.

The worst kept secret was the funding provided jointly from the Provincial and Federal Governments to bring 50/10 (fibre) to Ontario.

Rogers is currently building out that infrastructure. The largest concern we have right now, is pockets that may be missed or skipped. The Highspeed committee is working on these concerns. It is very important that everyone check that either their home has 50/10 or the new build will be installed in your area.

Budget

At the time of writing this, we have a proposed 4.8% tax increase. Puslinch Council and staff work very hard to reduce the impact to residents in these inflationary times.

Some may suggest cap budget increases at 2%. When you propose a budget increase that does not cover the needs of the organization, we have to cut some-

where. Things we can cut are, Winter Maintenance, Emergency response, Park Maintenance.

Puslinch Council is very proud of our current service levels and the quality of work our staff provides.

Puslinch receives 18% of your tax bill. If you pay \$5000 a year in taxes, 15% (\$1000) is education taxes, 18% \$900 is Municipal Taxes, 67% goes to Wellington County.

The Proposed 4.8 % increase is calculated against the Township portion of your tax bill. Puslinch receives a small portion of your tax bill, yet we provide the most noticeable services (Winter Maintenance, Parks and Recreation).

Remember when you calculate our proposed tax increase; calculate it against 18% of your tax bill.

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Human trafficking

Recently, Crime Stoppers Canada and Safe Communities Wellington hosted an insightful talk on this subject at Aberfoyle Public School.

During the event, attendees were left almost speechless as Sarah Bowers-Peters, of Crime Stoppers Wellington, and Constable Beth Hickey, of Wellington County OPP, shared the results of a massive Ontario-wide law enforcement project called Project Maverick.

To assume our children are safe solely because our community has a lower crime rate is naive, to say the least.

As the facts started flowing at the talk, a local school's principal confirmed incidents brought to their attention in recent years, emphasizing the need for local parents and caregivers to be vigilant.

Drawing from the staggering information given during the talk, here are some key points I learned or had fortified that I want to share to help keep our teens safe from human trafficking and/or sexual image-based coercions.

Establish Open Communication

Emphasized during the talk, open communication between parents and teens is crucial.

Creating a safe space where teens feel comfortable discussing their experiences, concerns, and online activities can prevent them from becoming vulnerable to traffickers.

Educate Teens about Online Safety

Human traffickers often exploit the

internet to target and groom potential victims. Educating teens about online safety, responsible social media use, and the potential risks of sharing personal information online is crucial.

Encouraging caution when interacting with strangers online helps mitigate the risk of falling prey to online predators.

Know Your Teen's Friends and Activities

Understanding your teen's social circle and being aware of their activities is essential. Establish connections with their friends and their parents to provide an additional layer of protection.

Educating teens about the importance of only allowing known friends into private chats helps mitigate the opportunity for grooming.

Be Aware of Warning Signs

Crime Stoppers Canada highlighted several warning signs that may indicate a teen is at risk of trafficking.

These signs include changes in behavior, health, and hygiene, alterations in social circles, personality shifts, and changes in schedule.

Recognizing these indicators and fostering open communication, the talk stressed the importance of having a phone/online contract to navigate your instincts.

Other behaviors to watch out for are unexplained absences, possession of expensive gifts, or involvement in an abusive relationship.

Being vigilant and recognizing these indicators can prompt timely intervention to protect the teen from further harm.

Keep your Kids Cyber Safe

As mentioned, having a device contract is important to ensure your child is behaving properly online. The analogy used in the talk was "You wouldn't give your kids the keys to a Ferrari without driving

Ensuring all of your privacy settings are high, and keeping personal information and location off of public posts and chats was also mentioned.

As AI (artificial intelligence) gets smarter it is easier for strangers to locate someone based off of landmarks in photos. Ask your kids about who is sending them DM's (direct message) and keep the communication open about what they are talking about while online.

By fostering open communication, educating teens about online safety, staying involved in their lives, recognizing warning signs, and promoting empowerment, parents and guardians can play a pivotal role in preventing the victimization of their children and teens.

What to do if your child or teen receives something inappropriate?

Advise your kids to bring it to you and not delete it before you can see it, enabling you to inform the police, the school, or other trusted associations.

After contacting the police, delete the image and do NOT forward it to anyone, even to show a friend the disturbing image your child received.

The hope is that the more information and education is shared around cyber safety and safeguarding our kids the less access these criminals will have to youth.


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Puslinch Resident Receives OPP Commissioner's Citation for Lifesaving Award



In a picturesque town on a sunny afternoon, Vince and Kimberley Klimkosz set out for a week-long vacation at their family cottage in Kincardine.

Seeking a change of scenery during the pandemic lockdown, the couple found themselves strolling through downtown Kincardine.

Disappointed to discover that the lighthouse museum and Walker house were closed due to pandemic rules, they decided to head back to their vehicle parked at the Marina.

As they meandered along, taking in the views of sailboats and the bridge, the tranquility of the moment was shattered by a sudden loud bang.

Their attention turned to a silver sedan crashing through the boat launch fence and plunging into the water below.

Without hesitation, Kimberley and Vince rushed to the scene, where the vehicle was rapidly filling with water, perilously close to submerging completely.

Kimberley, displaying remarkable courage, quickly discarded her shoes and, fortunately already clad in her bathing suit from an earlier swim, dove into the water.

Her immediate goal was to open the car door and free the occupants trapped within. Despite her valiant efforts—diving down to the vehicle three times—she found herself unable to access the submerged car as it sank further into the deep water.

Help arrived swiftly, but by then, the vehicle was no longer visible, marking a tragic turn of events. Regrettably, an elderly couple lost their lives that fateful day.

Kimberley, however, humbly believed she had not done anything extraordinary and initially resisted the acknowledgment that would follow.

Despite her efforts to evade recognition, the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) pursued Kimberley for almost a year to present her with the OPP Commissioner's Citation for Lifesaving Award.

The award, along with two Lifesaving pins, was finally presented to Kimberley at her husband's workplace. The OPP, recognizing the rarity of receiving two lifesaving awards, commended Kimberley for her courageous actions on that unforgettable day.

It is a testament to her character that Kimberley, though hesitant to accept the accolade, should take pride in the recognition bestowed upon her.

In the midst of tragedy, her bravery and selflessness stood out, prompting the OPP to acknowledge her exceptional efforts.

Vince and Kimberley express their sincere gratitude to the OPP, firefighters, the dive team, and the officers who provided solace and support to their family in the aftermath of the heartbreaking incident.

COOK'S CORNER

Now that the holidays are over, it may be time for simple, economical foods to see us through the winter.

With that in mind, I have featured potatoes and pasta in this month's recipes. The tortilla is a very common staple in Spain and is easily made.

The fusilli dish may become your go-to pasta recipe and you can vary it with different types of pasta and sausage.

Tortilla with Red Pepper



6 tbsp. olive oil
1 pound of potatoes, diced
1 Spanish onion, chopped
1 red bell pepper, chopped
5 eggs
1 tbsp. chopped fresh parsley
Salt & pepper

- Heat olive oil in a large, heavy, ovenproof skillet.* Add potatoes, onion, bell pepper. Cover and cook over low heat 15 to 20 minutes until soft but not brown, stirring occasionally to prevent sticking.
- Drain off and reserve oil. In a bowl, lightly beat eggs. Add the potatoes, onion, bell pepper and chopped parsley. Season with salt and black pepper. Let stand 10 minutes.
- Wipe skillet with paper towels. Add enough reserved oil to cover skillet bottom. Add egg mixture, spreading

it evenly in skillet.

- Cook in oven at 350°F until eggs are set. Place under broiler to brown top. Serve warm or at room temperature. Serves 4 main-dish servings or 8 tapas.
- * You can also cook on top of stove and then put it under broiler.

Fusilli with Sausage



1 onion, chopped 3 cloves garlic, minced 1 tsp. oregano ½ tsp. each basil and salt Pinch hot pepper flakes 1 lb. Italian sausage, cut into bite-size chunks* 28 oz. (796 ml) can diced tomatoes

¼ cup tomato paste 1 cup 18% cream 12 oz. fusilli or rigatoni pasta

- In a large saucepan, melt butter over medium heat. Cook onion and garlic for 2 minutes. Stir in oregano, basil, salt and hot pepper flakes and cook for 1 minute.
- 2. Cook sausage chunks in a frying pan.
- Add sausage to onion mixture, along with tomatoes, tomato paste and cream. Bring to a boil; reduce heat and simmer uncovered, stirring occasionally for 15 minutes.
- Meanwhile bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Add pasta; cook according to package directions. Drain well; return to pot. Pour in the sauce, stirring until pasta is well coated.
- * I use mild Italian sausage.

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Telling our story

The Puslinch Historical Society is happy to announce that 2024 will mark the fortieth year of its activities in the Township.

In the early 1980's, a few historians and genealogists were quietly working in Puslinch. Noting this, in October 1983, Gary Collins invited a small group to her home and proposed that an organization be formed.

Successive meetings were held in early 1984, resulting in the founding of the Puslinch Historical Society by 26 members.

The aim was stated as to research, collect, preserve, and share the history of our township and the genealogy of its families.

Jean Barber was the first president and Marjorie Clark, the first secretary-treasurer. The group held its first meeting, with a speaker, in May 1984 in the basement of Morriston Mount Carmel United Church.

Shortly thereafter, the new society had

a collection of printed history, housed in one drawer of a filing cabinet in a corner of the new Aberfoyle Library.

Puslinch Township Council offered the use of a room, shared with the O.P.P., in the Puslinch Municipal Office, in 2002. This room was promptly stuffed with information. A larger room was provided in the Aberfoyle Library in 2010.

The PHS Archive is open to all every Saturday from noon to 3 p.m. and research help is always available. The group has assembled an excellent collection.

Members have hosted researchers to the Archives from Germany and Scotland, New York City, Virginia, Florida, Kansas, California, Utah, Oregon, as well as from the Canadian West, Ontarians, and local residents.

Drawing on this extensive collection, members have responded to hundreds of queries by e-mail and letters, over the years.

The Society published two books by member, Anna McCormick Jackson, David Stirton, A Man of Many Talents and Puslinch Lake and Its Past, as well as The McPhatter Letters and Puslinch Profiles 1850-2000, a group effort to commemorate the Township's 150th

anniversary.

Individual members have contributed their own written publications to the storehouse of information.

Meetings have presented interesting guest speakers. Many events have been held throughout the years. "Spirit Walks", featuring stories about selected early Puslinch inhabitants, read at their gravesides, and historical walks in villages and on streets have proven popular.

These were produced by Betty Andersen and Lynn Crow.

You are invited to view selections from our spectacular photograph collection at the Optimist Canada Day breakfast and at Aberfoyle Fair, this year, 2024.

The group acquired a website about 2002 – www.puslinchhistorical.ca. A newsletter, currently published twice a year, updates interested parties on our activities and acquisitions.

The Historical Society has been telling the story of Puslinch and its people for forty years.

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
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YOUR HEALTH MATTERS

Blood sugar issues? If answer yes...Then ask "How is sleep?"

If the answer is "Not long and not great, and I'm usually tired in the morning." here's how blood sugar and sleep are related.

Do you snack into the late evening, usually on cookies or chips? This habit interferes with sleep and metabolism. Poor sleep affects hormones.

Cortisol – When you don't get quality sleep, the stress hormone cortisol increases, which releases stored glucose; chronic exposure contributes to waist area weight gain.

Insulin - Increase in cortisol triggers release or stored glucose, making it harder for insulin to properly regulate sugar. Blood sugar highs and low and disrupts the next night's sleep.

Ghrelin and leptin – Hunger and satiety hormones misalign with poor sleep, stimulates strong cravings for quick energy sources like doughnuts, orange juice, sugary cereal or other processed foods.

How do you get off this roller coaster? Blood sugar is regulated better with regular whole food meals. The body responds well with low to no alcohol or processed foods.


Big meals consumed at least two hours before bed gives some time for digestion, and, if hungry later, a small high protein snack high in fibre and protein is generally helpful. Sources like nuts and seeds, lean cuts of meat, legumes, beans, high protein plain unsweetened yogurt are a great option.

The body loves routine! Going to bed at the same time and wake at the same time every day, including weekends can be helpful.

Early morning light exposure can aid in regulating the circadian rhythm. This can be as simple as a 15-minute walk on rising.

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

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Ask the expert

Question: As prices at nurseries rise, how can I increase my garden stock or grow vegetables more economically?

Answer: Seeds!

It's that time of year when gardeners spend inordinate amounts of time poring over seed lists—online, catalogues, local seed exchange programs.

Seed gathering and sowing are, in fact, two of the most addictive and exciting areas of gardening.



It's just so gratifying to watch the seed you've planted bear fruit, develop swoon-worthy flowers, or grow into a future shrub or shade tree that becomes protection or home for various creatures.

My 5 metre Kentucky Coffee Tree, grown from seed, excites me even more than the first crunchy peas or the first bloom on a rare, hard to source perennial.

And I would just like to say here, while many people think first of seed



ing vegetables and annual flowers, don't shy away from starting tree seeds. Many are straightforward, and your efforts are for the future—this is so important.

When your ordered seeds start to arrive, and your non-gardening partner sighs more notably with each arrival, you secretly wonder what has possessed you.

What on earth are you going to do with all those seeds, how are you going to germinate them or grow them on into the productive and beautiful plants in your mind's eye?

Ignore your misgivings! Recognize that seeds are amazing—even the tiniest, dust-resembling seed holds a future plant. And they are so varied. How is that not entrancing?

Furthermore, a packet of seeds is much cheaper than purchasing potted plants. Many seeds will keep for years, so you don't have to plant the whole package the year you order—you will have some for subsequent years.

You might even get interested enough to start saving your own seeds.

A few generalities:

Most annual seeds are easy to germinate. Seeds need moisture, air and

light, in varying degrees.

Seed packets come with instructions. In general, follow these. If you are ordering rare and unusual seeds, research germination requirements.

There is so much information quickly available now.

The Ontario Rock Garden Society has an excellent accessible germination guide online for hundreds of perennials.

On his website Gardenmyths.com local master gardener Robert Pavlis has posted several helpful seed starting techniques.

Use a good seed starting mix. Invest in LED grow lights if you can. I'm still using an ancient light stand with fluorescents; these work just fine too.

Remember to lower lights close to sprouting seedlings. Use pots, trays, plastic salad containers—anything with enough depth for roots to grow.

If you don't have room for lots of pots, distribute seeds on a moist piece of paper towel and insert in a baggie. Keep on a counter.

You can watch seeds germinate, and then transfer to a pot (handle seedlings by their leaves, not their stems). Not all seeds are viable, so this method avoids some empty pots.

If your seeds need a cold period (stratification), unlike pots, baggies take up little space in your fridge.

Or google Winter Sowing—this works very well for many perennial seeds, especially natives.

So, take the plunge. Grow something from seed. Like everything else about gardening, you learn by doing.

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


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
